The evening was topped off with special guest speaker Mr Russell McGuiness who inspired us all with his compelling life story of personal redemption and purpose in life.

The annual sports exchange with Hauraki Plains at Hauraki Plains College resulted in another well-deserved overall win to Dilworth. Our boys won the rugby in convincing fashion, along with volleyball, basketball, table tennis and chess. We drew in hockey and lost the soccer match. This much anticipated annual exchange is about providing boys with opportunity to play competitive sport wrapped around a positive social experience with the Year 9 students of Hauraki Plains College. It was a great day and thanks must go to Mr Onyett for once again organising the exchange with Hauraki Plains.

On Monday 10 September over half of the boys were transported to a local hall to perform a concert for 200 Mangatawhiri Primary School children. The boys did a wonderful job of presenting musical items including performances by the Flute and Trombone Ensemble, the Brass band who were just outstanding along with other musical items and instrument demonstrations. The children seemed to really enjoy the whole event which finished with reciprocal hakas, one from our boys and one from the senior primary school boys led ably by Mr Fieten's young son, Noah.

Learning Journeys. I have been impressed by the high levels of understanding being developed in the boys and the engagement levels seen in the creative and interesting projects they have developed. We look forward to the opportunity to share this work in the coming weeks in Term Four.

In week eight and nine the boys enjoyed two interesting events, their first three-day expedition and a noho Marae cultural experience. Expeditions included a tramp in the Kaimai Ranges to try to find the wreck of an old DC 3 aircraft that crashed in 1963, an 82km mountain bike ride through the Pureora Forrest along the newly opened Timber Trail, lake kayaking trips on Lake Tarawera with swims in the natural hot pools found along the edges of Te Rata Bay, a survivalist camp in bush near Raglan and climbing and abseiling at Wharepapa South. Feedback on these experiences from the boys was very positive and we hope you get to hear more of the details of these special trips over the coming holidays. The noho Marae two-day experience was once again run at Umupuia Marae out on the Clevedon Coast. This special cultural experience allows the boys to be immersed in marae protocols, flax weaving, Maori tattoo designs, stick games, mau raukau training and learning to speak within the whare nui at night. Thanks, must go to our own Matua Jason Adams for organising this wonderful cultural experience. Boys also participated in a special half day art workshop led by Mrs Liversedge and some of the work produced was guite stunning.

All in all, a very positive Term Three at Te Haerenga and as a staff we are pleased with the overall progress of this special group of boys as they are becoming young men of good character that Dilworth was wanting to see.

From Message from the Chaplain

Term Three has been another fantastic term in the spiritual life of our School. In Chapel, we have been talking about what it means to live out a life of faith. A point embodied in two significant events this term - Baptisms and the annual visit of Bishop Ross Bay.

This term we celebrated the Baptism of 30 Dilworth boys. It was a special evening at the Senior Campus Chapel, with family and friends all gathering in support of these amazing young men. For centuries, baptism has been an initiatory rite of the Christian church. Through the cleansing symbol of water, Baptism represents the commencement of a life-long journey with Jesus.
